

Core Values



Some of the Benefits to Hermosa Beach

- Critical Coverage Station -- An engine company will be moved up into Station 1 if the engine company is committed to an incident lasting 30 minutes or longer.
- Initial Response to a Commercial Structure Fire -- 5 engines, 2 trucks, 1 paramedic squad and 2 battalion chiefs.
- Integrated Command -- Fire, emergency medical and lifeguard services.
- Replacement Vehicles -- Funded through the overhead paid annually.
- Constant Staffing -- All vacancies will be backfilled by uniformed Fire District staff (over 2,000 uniformed personnel)



Hometown Attentiveness

The Fire District protects 58 cities and all the unincorporated areas in Los Angeles County:

- Cities of all sizes, with populations less than 500 and more than 200,000
- Each city is assigned an Assistant Fire Chief, who act as each city's fire chief for day-to-day operations and attends city council meetings
- Each city is assigned a community services representative, who assists with coordinating city events with Fire District staff

Next Steps

Brief Overview (assumes approval at each step):

- 1. City and Fire District conclude Service Agreement negotiations.
- 2. City Council approves the negotiated Service Agreement.
- 3. Fire District applies to the Local Agency Formation Commission (LAFCO).
- 4. LAFCO holds public hearing, approves annexation.
- 5. Board of Supervisors holds public hearing and approves Service Agreement.
- 6. LAFCO records annexation.
- 7. City adopts Fire District Code.
- 8. Service begins on mutually agreeable date.
